

National Screening Programmes – Privacy Notice

Summary:

The NHS provides national screening programmes so that certain diseases can be detected at an early stage. These currently apply to bowel cancer, breast cancer, aortic aneurysms and diabetic retinal screening service. The law allows us to share your contact information with Public Health England so that you can be invited to the relevant screening programme.

How does this comply with the Common Law Duty of Confidentiality?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Consent <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Implied (e.g. direct care) ○ Explicit (e.g. 2^ouses) • COPI Regulations 2002 (e.g. Reg 5 - “s251”) • “overriding public interest” (to safeguard you or another person) • legal obligation (e.g. court order) 	<p>Consent (implied)</p> <p>This means that it would be reasonable to infer that you agree to the use of the information as long as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We are accessing the information to provide or support your direct care, or are satisfied that the person we are sharing the information with is accessing or receiving it for this purpose • Information is readily available to you, explaining how your information will be used and that you have the right to object • We have no reason to believe that you have objected • We are satisfied that anyone we disclose personal information to understands that we are giving it to them in confidence, which they must respect

The existence of each of your rights</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - <i>The right to object</i> - <i>The right to access and correct</i> 	<p>Article 6(1)(e) gives the data subject the right to object i.e you have the right to object to some or all the information being processed under Article 21. Please contact the Data Controller or the practice.</p> <p>You should be aware that this is a right to raise an</p>

	<p>objection, that is not the same as having an absolute right to have your wishes granted in every circumstance</p> <p>You have the right to access the data that is being shared and have any inaccuracies corrected. There is no right to have accurate medical records deleted except when ordered by a court of Law.</p> <p>You have the right to object to this processing of your data and to some or all of the information being shared with the recipients. Contact the Data Controller or the practice.</p> <p>For national screening programmes: you can opt so that you no longer receive an invitation to a screening programme.
